JIM HOCKING grew up on the mission field in the Central African Republic. He completed an MDiv from Grace Theological Seminary and subsequently spent 20 years as a Grace Brethren missionary in the CAR with his family. More recently he has started a non-profit ministry called Water for Good, which is drilling and maintaining wells in villages across the CAR, promoting post-war reconciliation efforts, and producing gospel radio broadcasts. The water for good teams now care for the water pumps of over 600,000 people, providing them with clean water on a daily basis.



DENISE KETTERING-LANE serves as Assistant Professor of Brethren Studies at Bethany Theological Seminary. She received a BA in Religion from Ashland University in Ohio and a Masters in Theological Studies from Candler School of Theology at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. Denise completed a PhD in Religious Studies at The University of Iowa in May 2009. She has served as a research fellow at both the University of Iowa and at the Institute for European History in Mainz, Germany. Her research focuses on gender issues within German Pietism.



CARL BOWMAN serves as Director of Survey Research at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Culture at the University of Virginia. He has edited several books and has written numerous articles on Brethren history and doctrine. He serves on the board of Brethren Encyclopedia, Inc.



SAM FUNKHOUSER resides with his family in Franklin County, Virginia, and is a member of the Old German Baptist Brethren, New Conference. He is a graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary (M.Div.), where he wrote a thesis on the theology of early Englishlanguage Brethren hymnody. Sam currently serves as the Director of Risk Management for Family Preservation Services of Virginia, a community-based mental health provider.



WILLIAM C. KOSTLEVY holds degrees from Asbury College, Bethany Theological Seminary, Marquette University, and the University of Notre Dame (Ph.D.). He is Director of the Brethren Historical Library and Archives, Elgin, Illinois. He has served as Professor of History and Political Science at Tabor College and as archivist and special collections librarian for Asbury Theological Seminary and Fuller Theological Seminary. His published work includes Bethany Theological Seminary: A Centennial History, Holy Jumpers: Evangelicals and Radicals in Progressive Era America (Oxford University Press, 2010), and Holiness Manuscripts: A Guide to Sources Documenting the Wesleyan Holiness Movement in the United States and Canada (Scarecrow Press, 1994).



AARON JERVISS is currently a lecturer of history at Johnson University-Tennessee, located just outside Knoxville, Tennessee. He is a graduate of Ashland University (1992), Ashland Theological Seminary (2004), and earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of Tennessee in 2013 with a dissertation entitled "Christian Heroes and Blood-Stained Villains: The Civil War in Historic Peace Church Memory, 1865-1915", a look at the Civil War memory of the three historic peace churches (Quakers, Mennonites, and the German Baptist Brethren).



JASON BARNHART is the Director of Brethren Research and Resourcing for the Brethren Church National Office in Ashland, Ohio. Jason has over a decade of pastoral experience in congregations in Ohio. He served for three years (2014-2017) as the University Chaplain of Ashland University in Ashland. Jason was co-editor of A Brethren Witness for the 21st Century (2014) and co-edited a primer for the work, A Brethren Witness Primer (2015), for youth and young adults. He is also the editor of the forthcoming book, A Brethren Vision, which is a re-release of the late Dr. Brian Moore's book, A Brethren Witness for the 21st Century (2008). Jason is currently finishing doctoral work at La Salle University in Philadelphia, PA. He resides in Ashland with his wife, Allison, and two children, Miles and Clementine.

He is a recent graduate from The College at Brockport's history M.A. program, and plans to continue his studies at the doctoral level in the near future.



THE REV. DR. MUSA MAMBULA is International Scholar in Residence at Bethany Theological Seminary. He has an M.A. in theology (Bethany Theological Seminary), an M.S. in education (National Louis University), and a Ph.D. in educational foundation (University of Maiduguri, Nigeria). He has served as an educational leader in Nigeria and as a spiritual advisor for Ekklesiyar Yan-Uwa A Nigeria. Musa has published over 40 articles and six books, including Are there Limits to Pacifism? The Nigerian Dilemma. He is a regular speaker for seminars, workshops, and conferences.

He is the author of Voices of the Turtledoves: The Sacred World of Ephrata and coauthor with Michael Birkel of Genius of the Transcendent: Mystical Writings of Jakob Boehme.



JARED BURKHOLDER was born and raised in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, received his Ph.D. from the University of lowa and serves as department chair and Professor of History at Grace College in Winona Lake, IN. He has co-edited Becoming Grace: Seventy-Five Years on the Landscape of Christian Higher Education in America and his articles have appeared in Pennsylvania Mennonite Heritage, Brethren Life and Thought, Fides et Historia, and the Journal of Moravian History. He is currently working on a book about the history of evangelical perceptions of German Pietism.
